Chairman's Message

When called upon to reflect on the events of the last 12 months I cannot remove from my mind the enthusiasm and energy that was portrayed at the recent national conference of the Country Education Foundation of Australia.

It embodied all of the diversity and grassroots energy that is available to the task we have set ourselves, to progress the opportunities for young people embarking on their careers after completing their secondary education.

It has never been more evident in regional Australia that we are suffering a disadvantage when it comes to the allocation of enabling infrastructure in educational resources to our young people. This is most obvious when looking at the degree of difficulty now surrounding study allowances and assistance in moving away from home to continue more advanced education and training.

Whilst much has been promised with regard to NBN there are very few of our communities that today have shown any benefit and whilst one harbours hopes that this will change in coming years, the lack of access to formal education and training particularly in the TAFE arena has never been more pronounced.

The other striking message from our recent conference is the strength and commitment of our university partners. Universities in the last ten years have really changed their outlook on where they draw students from and the care that they apply to their pastoral as well as educational wellbeing.

The partnerships that we have formed have been a great opportunity to communicate the difficulties that some of our young students face in embarking on further education. This extends not only to the natural lack of affinity with the more populace city based campuses, but, the practical difficulties of accommodation and travel, together with the challenge of staying in touch with traditional family and community influences.

Whilst there is much work to do in this area I believe we have made headway and in part recognition of this we are now forging links with like-minded organisations to offer co-services. The Black Dog Institute is one such positive partnership being forged.

Further, a number of very constructive suggestions emerged from the conference gathering. One such idea was to portray a more unified identity. It is clear that applying students are often confused when they come to our website as to the connectivity of the Country Education Foundation of Australia with the individual foundations.

A further and important consideration is the confusion that exists in the minds of national benefactors and sponsors with the very different identities of our constituent foundations. The trick is going to be in getting a unified format without losing the identity and individuality of local foundations which has been a hallmark of our success.

The update of our own technology, office infrastructure and website has been a fundamental necessity for some time. We are driven by the desire to make more efficient and more time economical the significant compliance issues that as a charitable organisation we face.

A priority is to reduce the time required of our volunteers in the communities in satisfying all the paperwork. The new website and technology improvements will bring about much needed gains in efficiency and simplicity.

Recently we held a 10th Anniversary celebratory function at the NSW State Library. At this gathering were many who were involved in the early days of establishment and in particular helped overcome the travails of achieving Deductible Gift Recipient status with the Federal Government. So many of those faces that supported us in those early days are still with us today, either supporting financially or providing moral support. Their faith in our work has been one of the underpinning factors in what we have achieved in the interim period. My heartfelt thanks to them all.

Once again I wish to record my profound thanks for the executive committee that works so closely on the advancement of your Foundation and the Board which has been unwavering in its support.

In conclusion I would like to pay tribute to our management team who under Sarah Taylor, our CEO, has shown a level of devotion and focus that has achieved much under difficult economic circumstances.

CEO's Message

When the very first committee of the Country Education Foundation (CEF) got together in Boorowa in 1993 they could never have imagined the impact they would have... A few thousand dollars for a handful of local school leavers was just the beginning.

Twenty years on, we have a family of over 40 foundations spanning four states and territories. Since 1993, our volunteer-run foundations have distributed over \$2.5 million in grants to almost 2,540 disadvantaged young people in rural communities across Australia.

Our anniversary year provided an ideal opportunity to pause and reflect on our journey and to ensure we were well positioned for a sustainable future. The focus of these efforts was the CEF Strategic Review which was enabled by contributions from our Board of directors, staff and local foundation volunteers, as well as contributions from service providers, donors and partners.

As a result of the Review we have confirmed a number of priorities for the period 2013-15, to ensure the sustainability of both the national 'parent body' and our local education foundations. These priorities include strengthening and developing foundations; broadening our funding base and partnerships; and upgrading technology and equipment to provide a more efficient and cost effective platform for our operations. By focusing on these areas we will build a solid platform for the organisation – to support our existing branches and continue expanding to meet the growing demand for our services.

The organisation has welcomed a number of new faces to the team in the past year – including my own following the departure of former CEO Annabel Gay. We were also joined by Jane Mackenzie Hollows who is working part time on administration. Together with our communications officer Kate Staniforth, finance officer Katie Walker and pro bono financial advisers, Boyce Chartered Accountants, we have a committed and hard working team, well positioned to meet the challenges ahead.

Our paid staff are also assisted by many volunteers, family members and friends who pitch in at peak times on a variety of tasks, big and small. We are especially grateful for their contributions.

Throughout this year of change, the CEF management team has received constant support from the CEF Board. In particular, I would like to record my appreciation and thanks to the Board and in particular our Executive Committee - Nick Burton Taylor, Julia Burton Taylor, Guy Milson and Katie Walker. Their commitment, experience, common sense and good humour have been invaluable.

Maggie Kate

It will be a proud day for Maggie Kate and her family when she graduates as a doctor. It's been a long journey, and a very personal one.

Maggie Kate was raised in a single parent family and is the first to go on to further education. Her sister, Deanna, was born with serious medical complications and not long after the birth Deanna had to be rushed to Canberra for life-saving surgery.

At seven, Maggie Kate sat in the back of the car next to Deanna's capsule, stemming the bleeding from the two-week-old's navel due to an unformed duct. Maggie Kate decided then and there that she wanted to be a doctor.

When she got into medicine at the University of NSW she achieved what many in her home town thought impossible.

Maggie Kate's local CEF supports her each year and while this grant covers only some of her total costs, it's enough to make the difference between staying in medicine or coming home to do a cheaper TAFE course.



Dimas

Dimas has come a long way since leaving Sudan over eight years ago, travelling to Egypt with his family before finally settling in Australia.

He has overcome many challenges since his arrival, including learning English well enough to complete his HSC and gain entry into university.

Dimas has been an active member of the community and was nominated by his peers and teachers to be School Captain, in his final year. Dimas received a grant in 2013 from the CEF in Cowra, NSW, to study medical science at Wollongong University.

For Dimas this is the first step towards pursuing his dream to become a doctor.



Kirsty

Veterinary Science student Kirsty didn't have long to go to finish her degree when she faced such financial hardship that she thought deferring from uni may be her only choice.

But thanks to a grant from the Blackall-Tambo CEF, Kirsty has been able to stay on at uni and now looks forward to completing her studies and to one day owning her own vet practice in the country.

The grant from her local CEF helped to pay her rent which meant she could utilise her savings to pay for textbooks and equipment.

Amy

Amy is the first person in her family to go to university. Originally from Roma in Southwest Queensland, Amy was forced to leave her hometown and relocate to Brisbane to pursue tertiary studies. With her parents unable to support her financially, Amy had to take a gap year in order to save enough money for rent and uni expenses.

The financial assistance she received from her local CEF was invaluable as was the advice and support from the committee members. Having support from her home town gave Amy the confidence boost when she needed it most.





Josh

Josh has always dreamt of owning his own plumbing business, so when he found out that he was getting a financial grant from the Yass District Education Foundation, he knew this would help him to achieve his dreams.

Now studying his apprenticeship in Canberra, the education grant has helped Josh enormously with the cost involved in moving away from home and buying the tools and equipment required in his trade.

After he completes his five years of study, Josh hopes to return to the country to work and one day start his own plumbing business.

The CEF family of foundations

Local people making a difference

CEF local foundations are run by volunteer committees who share a commitment to investing in their local youth – and in the future of their rural communities.

They include a broad cross section of people from all walks of life: business, agriculture, education, community and the public sector.

CEF local foundations conduct fundraising events and source donations throughout the year, in order to provide grants to disadvantaged young people in their communities.

Grants are allocated according to financial need, for a range of post-school education and employment pursuits. These include TAFE and university, cadetships, traineeships and entry-level jobs.

Grants are 'non-cash' and can cover any education or work-related expenses including:

- text books,
- trade tools and work equipment
- petrol
- train and bus tickets
- accommodation
- computers and internet access.

In 2013 the CEF welcomed three new foundations to the family, in the NSW communities of Gwydir Valley, Macleay Valley and Shoalhaven.

With these foundations we now have a network of over 40 local foundations spread across New South Wales, the Northern Territory, Queensland and South Australia.



Local people supporting local youth

The great thing about the CEF model is the local focus. Local communities getting together to help their young people get a foothold into higher education, training or that first job after leaving school.

They do this by fundraising and seeking donations throughout the year and then distributing these funds, to local school-leavers who need financial assistance to reach their education or career goal.

CEF grants are 'non cash' ie recipients are reimbursed for education or work-related purchases or providers

are paid directly for pre-agreed expenses, if the student can't afford the up front cost.

For most of our grant recipients the biggest costs are travel and accommodation. Leaving home and relocating to city areas can be extremely expensive – and most CEF grant recipients are also working one or more part time jobs to help make ends meet.

But it's not just about the money.

The extra support and the comfort of knowing that their community believes in them and is prepared to back them, also makes a huge difference.

Supporting volunteer committees

The biennial CEF Conference is an important forum for our local foundations, bringing volunteers together to share information and ideas on a range of subjects.

The 2013 Conference in Sydney attracted a record attendance of volunteer committee members from NSW, SA and NT, along with board members, staff and partners.

After a rousing opening address by CEF Ambassador, The Hon Tim Fischer AC, participants spent the day discussing everything from fundraising and event planning to accounting and governance.

A key focus for the event was sustainability and succession planning.

While these are important issues for any organisation they are particularly important for CEF local foundations which are run entirely by volunteers, most of whom are also juggling full time employment and other community commitments.

The 2013 Conference was made possible thanks to generous financial support from our partners Macquarie University, The Kirby Foundation, The Origin Foundation, Boyce Chartered Accountants and Chapman Eastway.

CEF education partners

Working with universities and colleges

One of the great advantages of the CEF model of support is our partnership program with universities and colleges across four states and territories.

Our education partners understand the difficulties that rural and regional students face when it comes to accessing higher education and they share our commitment to breaking down those barriers - which are usually financial.

By providing matching grants and other financial assistance to the CEF students attending their institutions these education partners are making university study much more accessible for hundreds of

disadvantaged rural and regional students.

Their support also helps CEF foundations to leverage the funds they raise locally, to assist students with expenses such as text books, computers, course equipment, travel and accommodation.

In 2013 our education partners provided over \$200,000 in co-funding for rural and regional students from CEF locations.

This assistance makes an enormous difference for students who have no choice but to leave home and travel long distances in order to pursue higher education.

Creating new opportunities

The CEF also works with a number of our education partners to help rural and regional students to raise their aspirations and consider career options which involve university study.

We do this through annual university experience camps in the ACT (courtesy of the Australian National University and the University of Canberra) and NSW (courtesy of the University of Technology, Sydney and Macquarie University).

The camps are offered to rural and regional high school students in years 9, 10 and 11 who travel to Sydney and Canberra with their teachers for a three or four day visit.

Guided campus tours and activities over a number of days provide great opportunities for students, giving them a taste of university and the careers that higher education can lead to.

112 students participated in university experience projects during 2013.

The music and vocal workshop is a popular feature of the annual university experience at Sydney's Macquarie University.



Our generous supporters

Corporate and philanthropic supporters

The Country Education Foundation does not receive government grant funding. Our work in rural and regional Australia relies on the support of our corporate, philanthropic and education partners.

Over the past twenty years the CEF has attracted a network of friends and supporters who share our commitment to providing opportunities for rural youth and to strengthening and sustaining rural communities.

In February 2013 we had the opportunity to thank many of these supporters at the CEF Anniversary celebration in Sydney.

Boosting grant-making capacity

An important contribution towards the grant-making capacity of our local CEFs is that provided by scholarship grants from organisations including the McLean Foundation, Origin Foundation, Rotary Club of Sydney and the Snow Foundation.

Their support over a number of years has helped hundreds of disadvantaged rural school leaver to take the next step into tertiary education or a job. They've changed many lives.

In 2013 our scholarship funds were boosted with the addition of a major new scholarship funded by the Bruce and Robyn Loder Foundation. The CEF/Loder Scholarship will be awarded to five students from the Moree and Narrabri communities over the next three years, with a total value of \$172,500.

We welcome the Loder Trust to the CEF family and we look forward to working with them for the benefit of students from these remote locations.



Sharing the load

As a small, regionally-based not for profit organisation, the CEF is limited by its size and geography. We don't have huge numbers of staff or consultants and we always have a 'to do' list which far exceeds our resources and capacity.

One way around this challenge is the way we work collaboratively with a number of organisations who share our geographic footprint and our interest in supporting rural school-leavers, their families and their communities.

Our current Community Partners include the Isolated Childrens' Parents Association (ICPA) NSW, Australian Scholarships Foundation (ASF) and the Black Dog Institute (BDI).

In 2013 we've worked with these organisations to share ideas and resources and develop new approaches to issues affecting rural and regional students.

We look forward to developing these relationships further for the mutual benefit of the communities we serve.
