"Every year thousands of disadvantaged rural and regional kids miss out on higher education because of distance and cost," Chris said.

"This is why riding for the CEF is so important to me - other rural kids should have the same experiences as I'm having right now at uni – and the chance to build their careers through tertiary study."

Exports Program at the Department of Agriculture in Canberra. He works with fruit and vegetable growers to ensure their products meet overseas quarantine requirements.

Thinking back to 2000, Adam says his grant - and knowing his community was backing him - really made a difference. "Without it, I wouldn't have been as successful ... I would have had to work two or three part-time jobs, instead of one, to cover my expenses."
