CEFA also partners with unis – including ANU, Canberra, UTS and Macquarie - to offer 'university experience' visits to rural school students.

These give rural kids a taste of uni and city life and the opportunities on offer.

We offer these to a limited number of communities in NSW but would love to expand them more broadly – including to Qld, SA and NT. We are keen to secure sponsorship and university support to make that possible.

We are also very grateful for the support we've had from individuals, families and organisations over the past ten years. I had the pleasure of meeting many of our generous donors at a recent 10th Anniversary event, which was held to thank them for this support.

Since the TVCEF started in 2007 it has financially assisted 52 students to the total of \$200,000 including co-funding from CEFA's three university partners in South Australia.

Annette is proud of the TVCEF's achievements, saying, "The TVCEF has helped their local youth to build self confidence, self belief and to achieve their ultimate career goals."

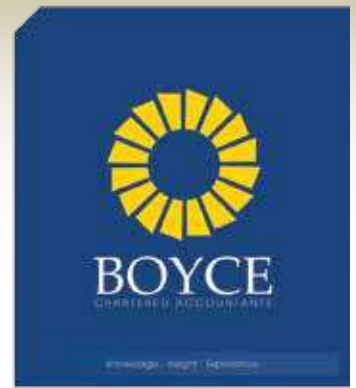
Boyce Chartered Accountants supporting CEFA
