Local Support Sparks Success

CEF local grant recipient Clayton Jericho has graduated from his electrical engineering degree and is now putting his building services and solar design skills to good use at the Adelaide plant of global firm KBR.

"It's great to be able to put my degree to work and see how what I learnt at uni transfers to a real job."

Clayton said he did pretty well in maths and science and thought he would like to give uni a go but didn't really know how things worked, as no one in his family had studied at that level before.

He applied to his local CEF in Kapunda for assistance and was awarded support for the duration of his four year degree at University of Adelaide.

"My local CEF helped me with four \$1,000 grants and I can't tell you how far that went to helping out with travel expenses, a new laptop and tablet and other expenses."

Clayton said for regional kids in South Australia local support can mean the difference between going to uni or missing out. "The financial assistance kickstarts you but more than that the support you get from the people on the Kapunda committee is what really counts

"I've been invited back to speech and presentation nights, which made me feel valued and respected by my community.

"Even though I graduated in 2015 I'm still in touch with my local CEF and keep them updated on what I am up to."

CEF's model of local support has supported almost 4,000 students to achieve their further education, training and career goals.

From Little Things Big Things Grow

When Terry Witchard read about Country Education Foundation in 2012 he was instantly hooked.

"This was something that really resonated with me and something I knew this area needed."

Terry knows firsthand that education is vital when it comes to unlocking opportunity for regional kids.

"In my time not a lot of people went on to further education: I always wanted to go to uni but knew Mum and Dad couldn't afford it, so I left school at 17 and got a job at the local servo."

Terry then worked his way up to management with ANZ and even ran his own mixed business for five years.

"When I decided to return to work I kept getting knocked back for jobs I knew I could do. I asked why and was told it was because I didn't have my HSC." So at the age of 40 Terry enrolled at TAFE. He then went on to university and earned a teaching degree.

Terry became a teacher and course coordinator at North Coast TAFE and in 2013 he established a local CEF in the Macleay Valley.

"I saw kids in our region who I knew had the potential to get qualifications, if only someone believed in them and could give them a kickstart."

"These days in regional areas there aren't opportunities for unskilled employment for kids fresh out of school. But there are jobs available for people with qualifications. The work is there, if they can just get the certificates and degrees they need."

One of Macleay Valley's first grant recipients has just returned to the area as a nurse. "She's working as an AIN and once she has her full qualifications she will be working in a skilled profession, making good money and contributing to her community.

Our investment in these kids pays dividends for the whole community - CEF recipients are living proof of this."

Emily Ryan from Coonamble in Western NSW might only be 21 but she's already kicked some major goals.

She is the youngest ever recipient of the NSW RAS Rural Achiever Award, a member of Gulargambone and Coonamble Show Societies and was a delegate at the 2016 Rotary Young Leaders Summit in South Korea.

And while that's enough to make most of us want to take a nap, Emily's also studying a Bachelor of Education at University of New England and working as a

special needs teacher's aide at a local school in her hometown

Emily, who is now in her third year of study, is being supported by CEF's local grants program. Her local foundation in Coonamble has provided Emily with financial support to make her dream of becoming a teacher a reality.

"I've always wanted to be a teacher, for as long as I can remember. But heading off to uni from a small town is a big step, both financially and emotionally."

Emily said she was so excited when she received news her local CEF would be supporting her. "I am so grateful for the support I am receiving, it's making a big contribution to my degree.

"The support has really opened up opportunities for me. It's helped me get to uni and see what's possible when you have access to education."

"The first year of support helped me move and get set up in Armidale. Then, at the beginning of my second year my dad was diagnosed with cancer and I moved

back to Coonamble to support my family and take care of my younger brother and sister while Mum and Dad went to the city for his treatment.

"It was great to be able to use my CEF funds to get home internet and equipment to keep up with my studies during this time."

Emily's dad's treatment was successful and he has been given the all-clear. This year Emily's grant is helping her pay for practical materials and attend her teaching placements.

"The support has really opened up opportunities for me. It's helped me get to uni and see what's possible when you have access to education. Education really is key for young people in rural and regional Australia."

Emily's passion for her local community is infectious and makes it easy to see why she has been chosen to represent NSW at the 2017 National Rural Ambassador Awards.

"My opportunities to travel as an RAS Ambassador and Rotary Young Leader have taught me some great leadership, networking and community engagement skills. But every time I travel I can't wait to get home to Coonamble. To me, this place is the meaning of the word community".
