The support we provide to rural and regional students is funded entirely by donations and fundraising and relies on the efforts of over

400 CEF volunteers across Australia.

Their combined efforts have contributed to a record level of assistance in 2015, despite difficult economic circumstances in many rural communities.

This includes 463 local grants worth more than \$652,000 and matched funding from our education partners worth \$333,401.

When you talk to students like Noelle (below) and Alex (p3) you get a real sense of the impact of those grants.

When she was invited to speak at the 2015 CEF Friends' Lunch and share the stage with leading Australian journalist, Fran Kelly, Noelle Swainston from Orange leapt at the opportunity – her first experience at public speaking.

Noelle, who is studying psychology at Charles Sturt University, shared her experience of leaving home to take up tertiary study.

She said many young people hope to attend university but worry about how they will manage when their parents may not be able to provide

the financial assistance that they need. "This results in financial struggle in the midst of trying to transition into adulthood, living away from home and focusing on study," she said.

Despite some very difficult circumstances Noelle has worked incredibly hard and achieved great results.

"In the year and a half since I first had contact with the CEF team. I have received constant support, understanding and encouragement through the loss of my mother to cancer in late 2014 and the diagnosis of my father's terminal illness in the same year.

"It's very much appreciated, as it makes such a substantial difference. allowing us to achieve what we often thought might not be possible."

In 2015, the CEF has again increased the number and value of grants awarded to disadvantaged rural and regional students.


Over \$650,000 in grants will go to 463 students from communities in New South Wales, Queensland,

If you live in Broken Hill, going to uni involves some tough choices.


Leaving home, adjusting to life without family and friends and finding accommodation and employment are iust some of the obstacles that Alex Rowbotham has overcome to pursue his goal of becoming a primary school teacher.

Alex is the first in his family to go to university and with the support of the CEF and Eureka Benevolent Foundation he is now studying at La Trobe University's Mildura campus.

The \$10,000 Eureka Scholarship was a huge help to Alex, covering travel and set up costs when he moved out of home.

He loves his course and looks forward to one day teaching in rural Australia: "I want to give regional students the best chance of education and to access resources they may not be aware of," Alex said.
