
CEF partnerships and committee liaison Juliet Petersen said: "Our volunteers are our greatest strength. CEF acknowledges all our committee members for their commitment to improving the lives of the young people within their district. The Katie Walker award is a formal recognition of these three particular volunteers who have demonstrated outstanding service in 2018".

This year's award recipients all agreed they were humbled to be nominated, because they don't do it for themselves but for their community's young people.

"It goes without saying receiving the Katie Walker Outstanding Service Award is a very pleasant surprise and I am really chuffed to be nominated. We don't serve on these committees for personal gain, it is more about trying to help someone less fortunate than ourselves and the students we assist are very deserving," John Trist shared.

He said the most rewarding part of his 11 years with Edward River CEF has been seeing young country students succeed.

"The interview process is a real eye opener. The students prepare themselves well and are full of hope and enthusiasm venturing out into the next phase of their lives in a challenging new environment. For many it is

the first time they will have been away from their families. We get to see these students graduate, and we now have qualified nurses, teachers, commercial pilots, engineers and veterinary surgeons among those we have helped," John said.

"Some of these students we assist come off farms where they have experienced prolonged periods of drought, so their parents have been doing it extremely tough. The students become guite emotional when they describe how much a scholarship will mean to them as their parents have very little cash flow. In most cases both parents are working just to keep food on the table. It is very rewarding knowing that you are making a difference."

For Ken Martin, of Coleambally/ Darlington Point CEF, his eight years as treasurer has been a commitment he has enjoyed.

"It has been a highly rewarding experience and I have been honoured to be a member of our grant selection panel on a number of occasions. Considering applications and then being involved in the interview process highlights the talents, ambitions and desires that our young people possess," Ken shared.

NSW, our grant recipients have gone on to become nurses, teachers, a landscape gardener, mechanical engineer, remedial massage therapist, doctor, commercial pilot and one has almost completed her Bachelor of Psychology to highlight just a

Chen Gaul, of the Hastings local foundation, said her role as treasurer for the past four years has allowed her to connect with local business owners and sponsors and share how influential CEF's impact on young lives can be.

"CEF is about the local people supporting the local youth. Our community's generosity goes a long way in making a difference in many young students lives," Chen said.

"The most rewarding thing with being involved in the work of CEF is hearing from our student grant recipients and learning how our support had changed their lives and enabled them to achieve the goals that would have otherwise been impossible".

Top achieving alumni recognised for first time

"Do the hard thing. Be persistent, and remember 'natural talent' doesn't define success. determination does": this is the advice Origin Foundation CEF Alumnus of the Year, Dr Ceridwen Boel, gives to young country students unsure about what to do after school. With a degree and PhD in subjects that many people can't even pronounce, Ceridwen is the perfect choice for the inaugural Alumnus of the Year award. Ceridwen says she is "very proud to be among peers of such high calibre and absolutely honoured to have been chosen for the award".

Since receiving a grant from the Yass CEF local foundation in 2008, Ceridwen has completed a Bachelor of Archaeological Practice (Hons) and Doctor of Philosophy (Evolutionary Biology/ Palaeoanthropology).

She now works as a researcher for the University of New South Wales and is a member of the ARC Centre of Excellence for Australian Biodiversity and Heritage. Her focus is now on research, but she still participates in archaeological digs, and last year was back in Yass for an excavation.

"Reconnecting with CEF was, for me, a powerful reminder of where I'd come from and just how much I have achieved over the last 11 years – and how much I have to give back," Ceridwen shares.

Ceridwen's story is just one of thousands CEF has influenced. This year, following the Alumni Program phase two completion, CEF is proud to acknowledge and re-engage with the country-raised students who are a part of our story. One way we are doing this is through the Origin Foundation Alumni Awards. Ceridwen is one of four winners announced

"I feel an unshakeable responsibility to lift my community in any way I can."

With a powerful connection to the land and his home community, Jacob, is now living with family in Canberra. When explaining his goal to one day move home to Walgett to share his experience and knowledge, he says he feels "an unshakeable responsibility to lift my community up in any way I can".

Jacob said, "when people from rural areas leave to pursue higher education there is often a longing for home and a disconnect that people feel over time." He knows from experience that when CEF provides assistance and touches base, it is a reminder that you have community support. That's often enough to give an extra push to follow your career path.

Another is Origin Foundation CEF Community Alumni Champion Crystal Stewart who said she was humbled to be nominated and it was especially meaningful for her considering how much CEF has played a role in her education. Crystal received assistance from CEF's Torrens Valley local foundation in 2010 to pursue her degree in education.

"Past recipients of CEF grants should really consider reconnecting with CEF somehow. I've really enjoyed working alongside the dedicated members of the Kangaroo Island foundation and have gained new insight into what goes into selecting and supporting students to achieve their goals," Crystal said.

Last, but not least, Dr Jessica Verwey has been named the Origin Foundation CEF Young Achiever award winner. Jessica, a Griffith CEF grant recipient, moved away to study vet science in Wagga, but in 2019 has plans to return to Griffith with her fiancé and an array of animals.

While studying Jessica won the 2017 Veterinary Science Medal, and is the first vet science student ever to be awarded the prestigious Charles Sturt University Medal. Since graduating in mid-2017

with first class honours in her Bachelor of Veterinary Science/Bachelor of Veterinary Biology degree, Jessica has a published academic article under her belt. She has spent time working in Young, NSW and most recently teaching back at CSU.

She encourages young students to follow their dreams and to seek support from organisations like CEF. "I think it's important that we support CEF and demonstrate to the next generation of students going through that, with support, country students really can achieve anything!"

Inaugural alumni ambassador Chris Mercer sums it up perfectly: "It is extraordinary to see the meaningful impact of Country Education Foundation alumni. Impact that is being felt in regional Australia and across the world".
