### Valuable day for volunteers

The fifth CEF national conference was held in Sydney on November 23, 2019. Themed 'Planning Today for Greater Impact Tomorrow', the conference focused on enabling our local foundation volunteers to work together to grow CEF's impact.

The planning centered around leveraging the unique opportunities and challenges each local community faces in the current environment.

This conference was made possible by our generous partner Alinta Energy. Their sponsorship enabled 38 volunteers from 21 committees to attend. Four guest speakers shared research, expertise, tools and advice on education, partnerships, community engagement and public relations.

World War II. The Foundation set up its first school in 1964 with 40 students and two teachers. Now, almost 650 students attend three schools in the West New Britain region. The grandchildren of the original students are now current students and the former students are now teachers!

"In the beginning they could not get the kids to come to school. Their parents, who had limited if any schooling, would keep them home for labour during harvest and they did not understand the value of education. The classrooms are now full and bubbling as the current parents who are ex-pupils, realise the value of education and make sure their children attend. We have been able to hand over management of funds and the administration completely to local community. This is a wonderful achievement," said Dougal. "We all have to be very patient with education goals and when assessing the effectiveness of charity, support, donations and learning opportunities. It's a long-term investment but there is no downside. You know you've been successful when those recipients come back and give of themselves and try to repay or return that support."

"In my opinion, education is the principal factor of difference between those who have and those who maybe have not. The only way we can change young people's lives is through education. You could give them all the money in the world, but if you are hoping to invest in lasting change and improvement, the only way to do that is by educating them."

Dougal hopes to facilitate and raise awareness of CEF's purpose in whatever way he can.
