THE QUESTION OF SELECTION

Rebecca Thistlethwaite, CEF Namoi secretary explains, "When you know the background of some of our applicants, it amazes me how resilient, resourceful and driven they are. The first in their family to finish high school, the first to go on to further education. Emancipated, and supporting themselves financially while

undertaking the HSC. And nobody knows this until they ask the right questions."

INCLUDE A CHARITY Make your mark



Finances are always a struggle for young rural regional students taking on study and heading into the workforce, and even more so on an apprentice's wage.

Callum Furner regularly travels almost two and a half hours to Bathurst NSW, the closest TAFE offering bricklaying. He needs to purchase his own set of bricklaying tools which don't come cheap.

But, he loves his apprenticeship and wouldn't be doing anything else.

MORE THAN JUST AN EMPLOYER

Callum loves the team dynamic of bricklaying and that he has a skilled mentor teaching him the craft at Tibbles Bricklaying in Goulburn.

Considered a 'master of his apprentices' Lester Tibble is one of the best. A member of the Australian "Skillaroos" who won the bronze medal at the 2011 International Worldskills Competition in London, he also won a gold medal at the 2010 competition in Brisbane and the 2009 Golden Trowel award.

Lester and his wife Renea are passionate about training high quality apprentices. They not only provide employment but also important mentorship and support and it was them who encouraged Callum to apply for a CEF grant.

HOW CEF HELPS

Callum believed that he was not eligible for support from CEF, thinking it was just for university students.

Now he knows that CEF and its 44 local foundations, like the Country Education Foundation of Goulburn and District, supports any type of study after school, and he encourages others to apply for financial assistance.

Brick by brick, Callum is building his dream



"I love that at the end of the day I can see the result of the hard work I've put in. Seeing what I've built throughout the day gives me a great sense of job satisfaction."

CEF knows there is no 'one size fits all' when it comes to study and wants students with all types of dreams and ambitions to apply for support.

The grant and scholarship from CEF and The Snow Foundation assist significantly in taking a lot of financial pressure off Callum, allowing him to focus on his training and work and motivating him to always improve.

ALL SUPPORT MAKES A DIFFERENCE

Callum's proudest moment so far was receiving his first bonus from his bosses for performing well onsite and at TAFE.

He says the support and recognition he receives from his employers 'cements' for him that he is on the right track and made the right decision to take up the position with Tibbles. Callum wants regional students to know that if university is not the right thing for them, they should seriously consider an apprenticeship.

He knows many regional students are 'in the same boat as him' when it comes to issues with distance and finances.

The support from CEF, CEF Goulburn and District, The Snow Foundation and great employers like Tibbles Bricklaying can make a big difference – and Callum knows this first hand.

Educational Equity

The issue of equity in education for rural and regional students has long been studied by tertiary institutions, government and independent organisations.

Here are some of the concerning statistics regarding our students when it comes to education:

- Successful completion of year 12 or equivalent drops from 78% in major cities to 43% in very remote areas
- Only 39% in regional areas and 32% in remote areas aspire to higher education
- Parents in regional areas are up to 12.3% less likely to expect their children to go on to higher education
- Over 64% of regional students worried about their financial situation
- 19% often go without food or necessities due to financial hardship
- Less than 1/3 of all Australians in country areas have a university qualification or higher-level VET qualification, compared to more than 1/2 in metropolitan areas
- ightarrow 31% of country students cite financial difficulties as the reason for considering early departure from higher education
- Up to 57% of regional students need to relocate for university studies
- > 28.4% of country students also come from a low socioeconomic background

There is no doubt that students from rural, regional and remote areas face unique and often significant challenges in undertaking, aspiring to and accessing education.

At CEF we know that no matter what our country students face, they find a way to make their education goals a reality. They are forever grateful for the support they receive.

The financial assistance received, together with the social, emotional and community support makes our students feel empowered and makes their transition to life after school a whole lot easier.
