

CLAIRE A VOICE FOR DIVERSITY

Living, working and studying in a regional community, Claire Miller is a bright young Indigenous woman, with a passion for agricultural mechanics. Thanks to a grant from CEF Orange & District and a VERTO – CEF Scholarship, she is one step closer to her dream. We are proud to share her story and belief in diversity in the workplace, enabling her to 'Be a Voice for Generations' during National Reconciliation Week.



What does receiving your local CEF grant (CEF Orange & District) plus the VERTO scholarship mean to you?

Receiving the local <u>CEF Orange & District</u> grant and the <u>VERTO</u> scholarship has given me the opportunity to purchase the tools and toolbox needed for my job every day, without any financial stress. It is greatly assisting with costs while I'm away at <u>TAFE</u>, such as accommodation and travel. Also, with the grant and scholarship they are providing many services and support to aid me in my studies and apprenticeship, such as a buddy project where there is some regularly checking in with me and how I am doing.

"I wanted to prove that you can do any job you wish if you are persistent and willing to learn, it doesn't matter who you are."

Why have you chosen to do you Certificate III in Agricultural Mechanical Technology and your apprenticeship with On-Trac Ag?

In year 10 when asked what I wanted to do after school, I didn't have a clear plan. I have always been interested in the agricultural industry. I did some work experience in a couple of jobs and really enjoyed the time I spent at On-Trac Ag. They offered me a trial late last year and I began the apprenticeship early this year.

"As an apprentice there is someone that is always willing to guide you and teach you new things every day."

What is the best thing about doing an apprenticeship?

The best thing about doing an apprenticeship is being able to leave school and begin working. With an apprenticeship it allows you to work full time while going to <u>TAFE</u> and studying the necessary concepts that you use everyday at work. An apprenticeship gives you the knowledge and experience needed when you're fully qualified to do the job efficiently and effectively.

What do you hope to do once you finish your study?

Once I have finished my studies at TAFE and my apprenticeship, I hope to continue working at On-Trac Ag in the workshop and out in the field. I would also like to leave for a while and work on a property using my knowledge from the workshop and using it in everyday farming life.




What does the Reconciliation Week theme 'Be a Voice for Generations' mean to you?

I also want to show that a female can succeed in her chosen field in a male-based industry, regardless of culture and sex.


BE A VOICE FOR GENERATIONS
