FROM BRAIDWOOD TO ADELAIDE: INGA NEILSEN WINS 2023 ALUMNUS OF THE YEAR

When 2023 Country Education Foundation of Australia Alumnus of the Year, Inga Neilsen, dreamed of one day being a TV news reporter, her classmates laughed at her.

The mere thought of it seemed such a long way from what was possible for someone from Braidwood, NSW, a tiny town of only 1000 people located west of Batemans Bay.

But, at just 26 years of age, Ms Neilsen has beaten all odds, and now finds herself working as the Police Reporter for Nine News in Adelaide, thanks largely to self-determination as well as the help of her community during some tough times in her life.

Right behind her was the Braidwood and District Education Foundation (BDEF), part of the CEF local network, which supported Inga with two \$2000 grants to support her during the first two years of her studies in a Bachelor of Law and Bachelor of Communications at the University of Technology, Sydney.

She said moving to Sydney from Braidwood was overwhelming, and the support she received from BDEF was a huge help.

Just finishing high school and getting to university was a tough ask for Inga, whose mum was diagnosed with a neurodegenerative disorder when she was just 5 years old.

When she was 11, her mum went into full time nursing home care in Batemans Bay. She would travel there three times per week with her dad until she was 20 years old, completing homework and assignments while in the car on the 45-minute trip.

While studying at UTS, Inga was one of just two students in her cohort of law students from a regional town, and one of very few that had a public school education - something she said made her feel proud.

Since graduating from university Inga has worked for Channel Nine on its news website, at the Today Show and now in Adelaide as its Police Reporter a promotion she got just a few months after starting there.

Inga said the work of CEF was extremely important in supporting all students like her from the country. "In my cohort there were 22 kids that graduated year 12. The majority of them received a grant to go to university or TAFE or further education. The money aside, the fact that as a young person you know you have an organisation backing you and supporting your goals is really important," she said.

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"A PROFOUND IMPACT": CEF CELEBRATES 30 YEARS OF HELPING COUNTRY YOUTH

Country Education Foundation of Australia (CEF) Chairman Nick Burton Taylor, AM, has described CEF as having "a profound impact" on regional and rural youth, after it celebrated its 30th anniversary on Saturday 18th November with a Gala event at Printhie Wines, Orange, NSW.

Around 120 people gathered to celebrate the momentous occasion, which included speeches from founders Nick and Julia Burton Taylor, CEO Juliet Petersen, and the presentation of the 2023 Alumni Award winners, supported by Audi Foundation. The audience was also treated to the stunning voice of local student Eleanor Edwards, a classically trained singer from Blayney, NSW, and a CEF Orange and District recipient.

CEF's first local foundation, CEF Boorowa, was established in 1993 by a group of like-minded community members, including Mr Burton Taylor and his wife, Julia Burton Taylor.

The community saw a great need for country youth to access funding and support to assist them in travelling away from home for further education – one of the major barriers they face compared with their metropolitan counterparts. The idea quickly spread with Yass, NSW, becoming the next town to form a local CEF foundation in 1998, headed by Katie Walker who would also become a founding Director of the national foundation.

Several other local foundations across regional NSW formed in the early 2000s and in 2003, Country Education Foundation of Australia incorporated as a national charitable entity to support the growing network of local foundations. Today there are 45 local foundations and more that 430 volunteers driving the work of the organisation across NSW, SA, QLD, Victoria and NT. Australia wide, CEF has provided almost 8000 individual grants and scholarships to the value of over \$17 million over the last 30 years.
